IMPROVING HEALTH FOR EVERY WOMAN AND EVERY CHILD THROUGH FRONTLINE HEALTH SYSTEMS

The Global Financing Facility (GFF) is a multi-stakeholder partnership helping countries tackle the greatest health and nutrition issues affecting women, children, and adolescents. The GFF brings governments and partners together around a country-led investment case, prioritizing high-impact but under-invested areas of health and nutrition.

Key among these issues is a focus on frontline health care systems – including the primary health care system, network of frontline health workers, and any public or private-sector service or institution that serves as the "first-touch" point when encountering the public health or health systems. These frontline health systems form the foundation of effective health care and are critical to achieving the UHC and SDG agendas.

It is these frontlines of health care systems that are most well-positioned to assess, treat,

educate, and refer for critical care and services, bringing health care to the most underserved communities, and neglected women, children, and adolescents. Yet the frontlines of health systems have been consistently neglected and under-invested in, and to achieve the SDGs, we must refocus attention, and investments, to improving them.

As countries plan and develop their investment cases, and implement them, this Resource Toolkit aims to provide country-level stakeholders a set of technical resources to inform planning, prioritization, and implementation to achieve RMNCAH-N targets through improvement of frontline health systems. The toolkit provides a compendium of evidence-based and best practice resources to improve frontline health delivery to achieve improved health for every woman and every child.

NAVIGATING THE RESOURCE TOOLKIT WITH THIS USER GUIDE




NAVIGATING THE RESOURCE TOOLKIT WITH THIS USER GUIDE

ASSESSING CONTEXT: MEASURING PERFORMANCE OF FRONTLINE SYSTEMS, AND PRIORITIZATION OF INTERVENTIONS

To develop the investment case, begin with a formal assessment of your frontline health care system

Assessment of frontline health systems is a critical component of broader situational analysis as policymakers aim to improve overall health outcomes. Formal structured assessment enables policymakers to establish a benchmark and understand current performance of the frontline system, and what and where challenges exist in their setting. This information then enables policymakers to prioritize health care challenges based on evidence and informed by understanding of return on investment of each potential intervention.

This section includes a selection of frameworks and tools to support Toolkit users with the process of assessment and prioritization. These topics are covered in detail in Section 5 of the Toolkit.



CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORKS:

These frameworks provide Toolkit users conceptual foundations of frontline health care delivery to inform assessment strategies for their own setting, and ensure all domains of the frontline health system are considered as a part of analysis. Examples include:

- Primary Health Care Performance Initiative (PHCPI) Conceptual Framework
- Community Health Systems conceptual framework
- WHO guideline on health policy and system support to optimize community health worker programs

ASSESSMENT FRAMEWORKS:

Structured formal assessment of frontline systems provides policymakers with baseline data about performance and status of health delivery critical to inform subsequent prioritization and improvement decision-making. In addition to HMIS, CRVS, national and sub-national health assessments. Examples include:

- PHCPI Core Indicators & Vital Signs Profile
- CHW AIM Toolkit
- Frontline Health performance metrics

PRIORITIZATION TOOLS:

Prioritization helps policymakers decide, in a structured analytical way, where to dedicate resources available to lead the most robust impact in health outcomes. Examples include:
